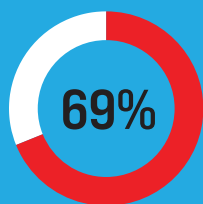


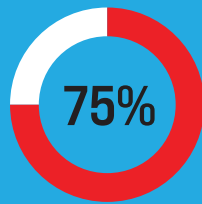

BLACK PARENTS WANT CHOICE IN THEIR CHILD'S EDUCATION

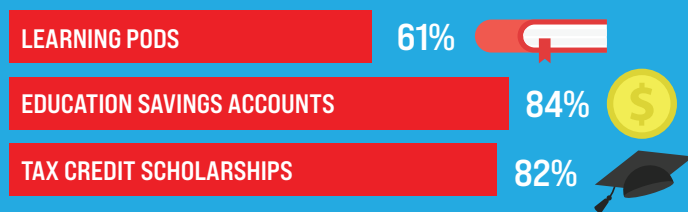


WANT FULL-TIME ONLINE LEARNING OPTIONS to be available after the pandemic ends

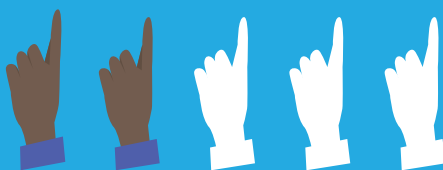

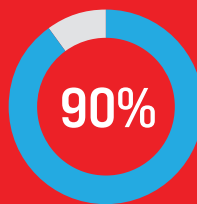
AT THE SAME TIME, CRITICAL WORK MUST BE DONE TO ERASE RACISM



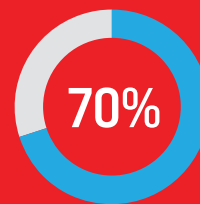
2 IN 5 say they or their child have experienced racism in schools
